One of the services was for my uncle Leroy Burdick. He was a pretty amazing guy - mostly because he was real good at being himself! We called Leroy 'Uncle Red' because of his (long ago) red hair. Uncle Red did magic, was habitually late, loved boats, and cooked pizza. But, he was so very much more. Professionally, he was a youth parole officer, a police officer, a social worker, a teacher, and co-owner of a commercial fishing boat.

Personally, Leroy was a father, grandfather, great-grandfather, uncle, and a really great guy.

In his church life, Uncle Red was a minister, teacher, companion, friend, servant, leader, and follower.

At his memorial service, several of his favorite scriptures were shared and some were discussed, I want to share three with you and then I want to share a thought that came to me about why I think we Christians sometimes seem to have trouble living out these profound scriptures.

John 15:9-17

9 As the Father has loved me, so have I loved you. Now remain in my love. 10 If you obey my commands, you will remain in my love, just as I have obeyed my Father's commands and remain in his love. 11 I have told you this so that my joy may be in you and that your joy may be complete. 12 My command is this: Love each other as I have loved you. 13 Greater love has no one than this, that he lay down his life for his friends. 14 You are my friends if you do what I command. 15 I no longer call you servants, because a servant does not know his master's business. Instead, I have called you friends, for everything that I learned from my Father I have made known to you. 16 You did not choose me, but I chose you and appointed you to go and bear fruit—fruit that will last. Then the Father will give you whatever you ask in my name. 17 This is my command: Love each other.
